**★AFI 16-601, 1 March 1996, is supplemented as follows:**

***SUMMARY OF REVISIONS***

A star (★) in the left margin indicates revisions from the previous edition.

1.1.1. HQ AETC/XOP is the AETC representative to the arms control working groups and will designate representatives as appropriate.

1.1.8. HQ AETC/XOPU designates the arms control program element monitor (PEM) for AETC. The PEM identifies arms control funding requirements and manages funding for arms control activities within AETC.

1.2. HQ AETC/XOPU is the AETC arms control office.

1.2.1. (Added)(AETC) Each AETC numbered air force commander and wing commander will appoint a treaty compliance officer who will be responsible for ensuring requirements outlined in this instruction are complied with for each treaty affecting his or her installation.

1.4. Questions relating to arms control activities within AETC will be referred to HQ AETC/XOPU for resolution.

★3.2. HQ AETC/XOPU will develop AETC compliance plans (CPLAN) for arms control agreements affecting AETC (according to attachment 3 [Added][AETC], Table 3.1.) AETC units are not required to develop separate CPLANs. Units will develop detailed procedures and checklists for use in implementing AETC CPLANs. Units will forward a copy of each procedure and checklist to HQ AETC/XOPU and provide affected base-level agencies with a copy. When requested by HQ AF/XOX, HQ AETC/XOPU will submit compliance reports.
